## Product Information Optical Lens Support

Often we are asked, “would it be possible to wear prescription glasses with your masks?”

OceanREEF manufactures an Optical Lens Support that attaches to the inside of the skirt. All one needs to do is take your Optical Lens Support to your optometrist and have them put in your prescription. The Optical Lens Support is designed to fit perfectly into the inside of your Neptune masks. Insert the frame into the inside of your visor, wear the masks as you normally would, and you’re ready to go.



## Technical Information Fogging Up?

Have you ever had problems with your conventional mask fogging up? This does not occur if you wear your Neptune full face mask correctly. If fogging occurs then one of the following things is happening and can be easily avoided.

- A. The ornasal cup is not seated correctly on your face
- B. The inhaler membranes (one way valve) are pinched inside the ornasal, allowing CO<sub>2</sub> to leak out of the ornasal area into the mask
- C. The exhaust portion of the ornasal has become dislodged from the exhaust valve port
- D. The opening where the microphone passes into the ornasal cup has a small “flange” or “ridge” under which the edge of the ornasal opening must fit. If it is dislodged CO<sub>2</sub> charged (exhaled) air will leak into the fresh air chamber, causing the mask to fog.

Remember, what keeps your mask from fogging is the constant flow of fresh air over the visor and the elimination of CO<sub>2</sub> through your exhaust valve. It’s important to make sure that the Full Face Mask is properly fitted to the head, face, and that the ornasal cup seals properly.

## Technical Information How to Handle an “Out of Air” Situation

There are several methods for dealing with an “out of air” situation with a Neptune full face mask.

The easiest method is applied when two divers are using full face masks. Each diver should have an additional hose with a quick connect attached to a low pressure port. The hose we suggest is the Ocean REEF 48” quick connect hose. The “out of air” diver simply swims to diver #2, disconnects his own hose, and connects the hose attached to his buddy’s 1st stage regulator to his mask. Both divers are now breathing from diver #2’s gas supply. At this time, both divers should swim to the surface.

Even after a diver becomes accustomed to the full face mask, we still suggest that they carry a conventional mask with them. In this case, the “out of air” diver indicates “out of air/share air” to his buddy, removes the full face mask, takes the buddy’s alternate air source, and dons the conventional mask. Both divers should then make an “alternate air source ascent” to the surface.

As with any diving equipment, it makes good sense to get training from a qualified Neptune System Instructor and do at least one confined water session before taking the mask in open water.

Healthy reefs, stunning walls, beautiful hard corals and soft corals, lots of sharks, massive mantas, turtles on every dive, huge schools of fish, tiny sea-horses, elusive mandarin fish and lots and lots of tiny critters are all topped off with an amazing collection of WWII wrecks! In fact, the wreck diving in Palau is one of the Pacific's largest collection of intact WWII shipwrecks and plane wrecks.

The majority of diving in Palau consists of drift diving along the beautiful walls, plateaus and coral gardens of the outer barrier reef, a forty minute boat ride through the picturesque rock islands. While you dive the boat follows along from the surface to meet you upon ascent.

Whatever your diving pleasure, level of interest or experience level, Palau diving has it all!
